





\$200,000 RSAT Grant Award – Oct 1, 2020 – Sep 30, 2021

Purpose

Develop a Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) Program at the Jefferson **County Correctional Facility.**

This Program will provide an opportunity for incarcerated individuals to engage in inpatient treatment services locally, gain a head start on their road to recovery, and benefit from Aftercare Services.

Awarded by HCA's Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery (DBHR), through

- Dept. of Justice (DOJ)
- Office of Justice Programs (OJP)
- Bureau of Justice
- Assistance (BJA)







RSAT Jail-Based Requirements

- the program

RSAT Aftercare Services

- Per 34 U.S.C. 10422(c), eligibility for funding under the RSAT Program requires individuals who participate in the jail-based treatment program to also be provided with aftercare services
- Services must involve coordination between the correctional treatment program and community behavioral health agencies.
- Services can include:
 - Education and job training
 - Recovery based housing
 - Self-help and Recovery Support programs
 - Ongoing behavioral health treatment
- Continuing any medication that was initiated while in-custody








How Will The RSAT Program Impact Improved BH Services?


- Lowers existing barriers to incarcerated individuals participating in an inpatient Substance/Opioid Use treatment program
- Supports improved interception at points 3, 4, and 5 - with the aftercare component of RSAT.













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

How We Got Here

- The CHIP focus for 2019 was completion of Community Health Assessment (CHA)
- This work was completed and presented to Joint Board in September, 2019
- Complete report presentations were made throughout the community October through December, 2019
- The Priority Team reviewed the CHA data late in October, 2020 and began prioritization in November, 2020
- At the November Meeting the Priority Team decided to look at these issues using different "Age Bands" to segregate issue





CHIP Planning Reboot – Timeline

Age Band Teams would start to meet between now and the end of the year:

- Review data, previous work, establish priorities and develop an action plan
- Develop goals, strategies and activities to support the Plan
- Generate a new CHIP document draft by August, 2021






C BHC as a CHIP's Working Age Band Sub-team
