Funding Request: Education & Engagement

Engage Anya Callahan of USAWA to:

- Build foundational understanding of prevention strategies and work with the community to bring a Harm Reduction Vending Machine to the Brinnon Community Center.
- Expand access to overdose prevention education, reduce stigma related to substance use, increase naloxone access and training, and grow understanding of related community needs in South County.
- Add 4 more Community Training/Education events to those already scheduled
- Collaborate with JCPH to execute zoom trainings.
 Develop a co-hosted set of videos on services available; how to use Narcan; articulate FAQs
- Execute direct outreach to the insecurely-housed

What is CARES?

EJFR CARES is also designed to be *proactive*, not just reactive. Fire based programs like EJFR CARES focus on the needs of people who have underlying behavioral health and/or medical and/or lifestyle issues (but without a need for police intervention).

Objectives:

- (1) improve the standard of care for individuals in behavioral health crisis reducing recidivism, promoting non-hospital alternatives to individuals with behavioral health needs.
- (2) ensuring overlapping issues are addressed and appropriately referred.
- (3) prevent crisis by addressing underlying behavioral/medical/social needs that—when unmet—lead to the use of 911 and emergent situations.

Jefferson County's population is also one of the eldest in the State, resulting in variable and often overlapping needs of an aging population.




The Goal of CARES is to connect and reinforce appropriate services and care, while reducing the impact to Emergency Services.

Members of our underserved community find it challenging to access variable resources. CARES helps establish the first step and ensures individuals stay on the right path.






Targeted Impact

Who else is doing CARES?

The Association of Washington Cities (AWC) awarded the funds allocated from the Washington State Legislature and the Washington State Health Care Authority (HCA). AWC received 20 applications requesting more than \$4 million.

After a review process, AWC and HCA elected to fully fund eight programs and provide partial funding to six programs.

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EJFR CARES will collaborate with a variety of agency partners with consideration to workload and specific care needed. CARES will work with partners such as food pantries, shelters, DCR, REAL Team, Navigators (County and City), counseling services, etc.

The CARES Believe in Recovery co-responder has the ability to intervene for substance abuse issues but there may be overlapping modalities that would be better resolved with a referral to another partner or a shared approach.

This topic will be specifically covered in the training with PFD and clarified in the policy development.



What training is involved?

The CARES Specialist will be assigned to Poulsbo Fire CARES beginning January 2 for two weeks. Focus will be on procedures, best practices, reports and documentation.



What is the daily routine for CARES?

- 1. Start the shift with co-responder prioritizing referrals which will come from Fire, <u>Jeffcom</u>, Law, partner agencies. Intermix with ongoing cases (check-ins).
- 2. Establish the day's schedule and check-in with BC.
- 3. Be prepared to adapt the schedule as needed for incident response.
- 4. Come back to CARES office at the end of the day for documentation and follow up.




