4. Please describe the success(es) you had related to consortium growth and/or engagement

Consortium engagement has continued on a monthly basis. BHC Member engagement during March, April and May included exploration of what the members want "being a steward of Jefferson County Behavioral Health" to mean; education and insight re: State v. Blake Decision and how to address its impacts to service connection opportunities in our County; and a BHC-focus group (23 BHC member/adhoc team participants) to share insights on SUD-related Stigma.

5. Please describe the success(es) you had related to data & reporting

- A presentation was developed and delivered to BHC members heard on their collective data collection effort. This data was provided by Fire & Rescue, Police, Sheriff behavioral health providers regarding # of encounters. The data also included types/# services rendered/issues/needs for patients of BHC service providers, including the Hospital, Jail, Discovery Behavioral Health, Safe Harbor, Believe In Recovery/Gateway to Freedom and Recovery Cafe for for the time period 9/01/20 2/28/2021.
- This presentation laid the groundwork for better stakeholder buy-in to having the Data group deepen their efforts with Police and Sheriff's Office to normalize their respective approaches to data coding.

6. Please describe the success(es) you had related to recovery

Recovery Cafe opened on March 11, 2021 as the pandemic restrictions began to lift. This has allowed them to provide peer-based recovery support services to more individuals (especially those who do not have access to telecommunication tools). Their outreach efforts have directly led to people accessing peer support and referrals to others services including SUD/MH treatment, primary care and state benefits.

8. Please describe the challenge(s) you had related to care coordination

Challenges include:

- Discerning how to deal with CFR42 Part 2, ROIs between service providers.
- The lack of coordination of the various "navigators" being hired by various organizations. This has resulted in chaotic implementation that has impacts the efficacy of those positions to affect the range from service providers, stakeholders to people in need of services in our community.
- New leadership at several agencies, retirement of several staff members within agencies, along with Critical Incident

11. Please describe the challenge(s) you had related to the COVID-19 pandemic

COVID-19 is a significant impact to all the work to improve the Behavioral Health issues in our community. The pandemic is starting to abate as more members are vaccinated, however challenges are mounting with several people retiring or leaving for other jobs, in addition to general organizational, fiscal, physical and mental health exhaustion at personal and professional levels.

12. What 14. Please describe the challenge(s) you had related to workforce—retention

Critical Incident Stress and pandemic exhaustion are present among many of our member organizations. Even as the pandemic is starting to abate and more members are vaccinated, challenges are mounting with several people retiring or leaving for other jobs, in addition to general organizational, fiscal, physical and mental health exhaustion at personal and professional levels. All of this impacts access to services.


15. What steps have you taken to resolve the challenge(s) you had related to workforce—retention?



BHC South County Harm Reduction Subgroup Page



Whereas: Addiction is a treatable condition, but the stigma and shame are often a barrier to

Whereas: When a loved one dies from a stigmatized behavior such as overdose the grieving process is often much harder for those left behind because of shame and guilt






